Our freedom from condemnation and sin is based on the finished work of Christ. Because of Christ's finished work, believers are set free from the domination of their old sinful nature; they are now under the control of the Holy Spirit (**Rom. 8:9**).

Because of Christ's finished work, believers are set free from the kingdom of darkness; they now have power and authority to destroy the works of the devil (Luke 10:19; Mark 16:17-18).

Because of Christ's finished work, believers are set free from the limitations of the earth realm; they are now seated with Christ in the heavenly realms (**Eph. 2:6**).

Because of Christ's finished work, believers are set free from their old identity of slaves; they are now ambassadors of Christ (**2 Cor. 5:20**).

Because of Christ's finished work, believers are set free from fear and insecurity; they will never be separated from God's love in Christ Jesus (Rom. 8:35-39).

Jesus said, "If the Son has set you free, you are free indeed." (John 8:36). If you think about it, we can celebrate Independence Day every day of the year. In the spiritual realm, we are truly free because Christ has set us free. We don't have to struggle and fight for freedom. Christ gives us freedom as His eternal gift.
